Northern exposure

In this issue we have a focus on Northern Australia with a challenging paper by former NELA President and Western Australian Barrister Greg McIntyre SC, who questions the legality of the Howard government's recent 'intervention' in the management of indigenous communities in the Northern Territory. Another example of legal arrangements which detract from the rights of traditional landowners is provided in an article by environmental engineer Dr Gavin Mudd, who describes the regulation of the Ranger uranium project in the Kakadu region. He concludes that the current plethora of legal instruments governing the Ranger mine does not provide the traditional owners, the Mirrar-Gundjeihmi people, with effective control over their land, or sufficient influence over the future of uranium mining.

Climate change law

This issue also contains further updates on the continuing development of climate change law in Australia, with the release of the Green Paper on the Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme in July 2008 and final report of the Garnaut Climate Change Review in September 2008. The Green paper proposals are explained by Elisa De Wit and Rachael Webb of Deacons Lawyers.
