AN ACT to amend the *Homes Act* 1935.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania,
by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council and House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled, as
follows:—

1 This Act may be cited as the *Homes Act* (No. 2) 1942. Short title.

2 The Principal Act is hereby amended—

I. As to section thirteen by inserting—

(a) “(1)” at the commencement: and

(b) “(2) If such land is adjacent to, or in the neighbourhood of, any other lands which the Board has so subdivided, the Board, in determining the cost of each lot as aforesaid, may have regard to the aggregate cost of all such lands so that the cost of all the lots determined as provided by subsection (1) hereof shall be equal to the total cost of all the land comprised in such subdivisions.”: and

New section
15.

II. By substituting for repealed section fifteen the following new section fifteen—

“Power of Board to Make Advances to Municipal Councils in Certain Cases.”

15—(1) If, with respect to any land set apart or acquired under this Part, it appears to the Board to be necessary, for the purpose of rendering such land fit for the use to which it may be put under this Act, that—

I. Any work shall be carried out by the council of any city or municipality: and

II. The council has not sufficient funds available for carrying out such work—

the Board, with the approval of the Treasurer, may make an advance to the council to enable the council to carry out such work.

(2) Every advance under this section shall be repayable on such terms, and subject to such conditions, as may be agreed upon between the Board and the council.

(3) The Board, if it thinks fit, may dispense with the execution of any mortgage or other security in respect of any advance under this section.”.
